The Wasef Manzil - a magnificent palace built by Nawab Wasef Ali Mirza; Nizamat Imambara - the largest Imambara in Eastern India: Katra Masjid - the oldest mosque of Murshidabad and Kathgola Bag - a beautiful palace with architectural marvels, are only a few of the many splendours that leave an impression on your mind.

#### MALDA



Ruins of Gaur Fort, Dakhil Darwaza, Bara Sona Mosque, Chhota Sona Mosque – all transport you to a bygone era with their heritage charm.

#### BURDWAN



Witness the Curzon Gate, built in the honour of Lord Curzon; Panchkula, a small village where Gajan Festival is celebrated passionately in May-June; the Konkaleswari Kali Mandir and Sivalingam temples, to get a feel of the town's heritage, rich with history, culture and religious diversities.

Other must-see places of interest are the Jhargram Raj Palace; Umapati Shiv Mandir, dating back to 10th - 11th century; Rameshwar Nath Temples and the Sahasralinga, built by King Chandraketu. If you are in love with the romance of history, then West Medinipore is a must in your travel list.


# BANKURA



# **BISHNUPUR**




