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CHANDANNAGAR BY RIVER

Formerly a French colony, the town is located 35 kilometers north of Kolkata. The name Chandannagar is possibly derived from the shape of the bank of the river Ganges which is bent like a half moon (in Bengali, Chand means moon and Nagar implies city). Various French mansions, a church and a strand make Chandannagar worth visiting.

What to see at Chandannagar

The Chandannagar Museum, Church, Chandannagar Strand, French Bakery, Patal Bari,

BARANAGAR BY RIVER

Baranagar was originally a Portuguese settlement that became the seat of a Dutch trading station and an important river anchorage for Dutch shipping. In 1795 it was ceded to the British. Constituted as the municipality of North Suburban in 1869, the city was renamed Baranagar in 1889.

What to see at Baranagar

Natore's Rani Bhabani made a Terracotta Shiva temple named the Bhewaniswar Temple, Charbangla Temple, Jigagunj, Biri Factory, Jain Temple, Baranagar Math, St. James Church.

BANDEL BY RIVER

The antique clock of Bandel Imambara is made of solid brass with Arabic lettering and weighs around 3 tons. The interior of the Imambara is decked with several chandeliers, Iranian carpets and the teachings of Koran are inscribed on the wall. The Portugese Church in Bandel, built in 1599 should also not be missed.

What to see at Bandel

Bandel Church, The Monastery, Hooghly Imambara, Hangseswari Temple, Pandua Bari Mosque.

MAYAPUR BYRIVER

Mayapur, which is the Headquaters of ISKCON temples, preaches the power of prayer to attain salvation. One also can visit the artisans at work at the workshops specialising in Bengal's handicraft, the bell metal wars.

SERAMPORE BY RIVER

This historic town remained under the Danish rule till 1845, after which the Danish Governor decided to sell it to the British East India Company. Built in 1818, the historic Serampore College, with its grand facade, is one of the oldest in the country, if not in Asia. Serampore also houses two Cemeteries from Danish times. Along the river are several colonial mansions, including the Baptist Mission Church.

CRUISING INTO THE SUNDERBANS

At the tip of the Ganges is a mystic mangrove forest on the myriad islands. Lush Sundari trees, water changing its colour at every creek from muddy river to emerald blue sea, narrow creeks to several miles wide rivers, where the man and man eaters eat fish to survive, crabs climb the tree, tiger swim long distances and mighty crocodile bask in the sun. This is a wonderland indeed and to be explored through waterways only. From the north to the south east to west, the cruise transverses the entire area anchoring in the most exotic areas.

What to see in the Sundarbans

Sunderbans Tiger Reserve, Mangrove Forest Walking, Experiencing the Village Life, Visit to the Local Fish Market This small town is famous for its ring of 108 Shiva Temples an architectural marvel. There are a few other temples within the temple complex which are also worth visiting.

Visit to see in Shantipur - the weavers' colony of fine Bengal cottons, the village rich in handloom weaving. The weavers here blend raditional art with modern life style needs, offering rich variety of textiles, sarees, stoles, fabrics etc.

BANSBERIA BY RIVER

The history of Bansberia dates back to the days of Shah Jahan. In 1656, the Mughal emperor appointed Raghab Dattaroy of Patuli as the zamindar of an area that includes the present-day Bansberia. Legend has it that Raghab's son Rameshwar cleared a bamboo grove to build a fort, inspiring the name Bansberia. The Hangseshwari Temple, which betrays tantric influences, is the best known of the Bansberia structures, but the adjoining Ananta Basudeb temple, small and elegant and crowned by an octagonal turret, is no less interesting.
